The Public Hearing regarding the proposed Local Law #1 of 2023 regarding real property tax exemptions for volunteer firefighters and volunteer ambulance worker for the Town of Charlton, Saratoga County, New York was held at the Charlton Town Hall and called to order by Supervisor Grasso at 7:30 p.m.

The hearing will be held on February 27 at 7:30p.m at Town Hall, 758 Charlton Road, Charlton, New York.

Supervisor Grasso said that the Town currently has a similar Local Law from 2006 that mirrored the County's Local Law. New York State came out with new guidance at the end of last year and asked that all Towns and Counties adopt a new Local Law by March 1<sup>st</sup> of this year. Saratoga County adopted their new Local Law last week. The Town desires that our Local Law match the County's, so the new revised Local Law is being presented tonight and voted on later this evening. One change made to the wording in the last month is regarding recordkeeping by the fire departments and this change came because of feedback received. On the Town level, the exemptions do not currently pertain because we do not have a Town tax or Highway tax. If we did, then it would.

The floor was opened for public comment:

Josie Jackson, resident, asked if a person signed up for the exemption, could they later revoke it? Supervisor Grasso said that you can withdraw the exemption at any point. People can take the exemption or the tax credit depending on which is most beneficial.

Dawn Szurek, resident, said that she thought that this was a great idea to help increase volunteerism, but since we don't have a Town tax, it really doesn't pertain.

Rick Jackson, resident, asked if there were exemptions on special districts because he was looking at the state website and it said that they could be included. Attorney Craig said that the State law may say that their can be an exemption on special districts but the County and Town did not opt to include that. Mr. Jackson said that for the 20year lifetime exemption, he does not think that you have to file annually. Mr. Jackson also asked about the exemptions being for just active members and could it be for inactive members. Supervisor Grasso said that he would look into this.

No one else chose to speak.

#### PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR FOR AGENDA ITEMS

Wayne Terwilliger of Saratoga Plan, said that he is here to seek the Town's endorsement of the Arnold and Bramer farmland preservation projects. He read the following report:

#### General Info:

Saratoga PLAN has 2 projects to present to the board this evening for farmland preservation. We would like to seek state funding for a purchase of development rights for each of these projects via an FPIG grant and we are asking for the town's endorsement.

#### BLUE CORNERS Farm – Mary & Lee Bramer and Mary Opalka

75 Acres – Located at 1068 Westline Rd in the Town of Charlton Approximately 33 ac (44%) of the farm is in active production.

A 3-acre lot with the original farmhouse and silvipasture lands is owned by Mary Opalka who is 104 yrs old and has lived on the farm her entire life. The house is one of the oldest in Charlton. The property includes a newer home, several pole barns, sheds and hay pastures for livestock. The southern portion of the property includes a stream actively dammed by beavers resulting in some flooding. Part of the western portion was previously pasture for dairy cows and there are plans to reclaim these areas. The property is a threegeneration farm with all three generations currently living on the property. Blue Corners is a historic site which was noted to have been land first deeded from native Indians in the 1700s. 1708 – stage route through busy hamlet 1700s. The Saratoga County Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board endorsed the project at their meeting on 1/10/23.

### SCOTCH RIDGE FARM – Kathy & David Arnold

44.5 ACRES located at 36 Jersey Hill Rd in Charlton.

About 29 acres are active farmland and are currently planted with corn. There are no structures on this parcel. The Arnolds own about 200 acres of adjacent land including a 156.3-acre parcel to the east. A PDR on the eastern parcel is being funded via a county grant which is contingent on securing state FPIG grant funding on the 44.5 acre parcel which we are seeking the town's endorsement for this evening. There is a state snowmobile trail that runs through the property and could become a linkage in the long-distance Long Path from NYC to the Adirondacks. The Saratoga County Agriculture and Farmland Protection Board endorsed the project at their meeting on 1/10/23

Jim Sevinsky, resident said that recently, two Charlton residents, Dawn Szurek and Jason Arnold went to the State legislature on Farm Lobby Day to lobby for the continued funding of the Environmental Protection portion of funding for protecting farmland. He noted that there are many people willing to preserve their farmland but there is not enough money to fund it.

### PROVIDING ENDORSEMENT OF SARATOGA PLAN APPLICATION FOR NEW YORK STATE DEPARMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND MARKETS FARMLAND PROTECTION IMPLEMENTATION GRANT FOR THE SCOTCH RIDGE FARM ON JERSEY HILL ROAD IN THE TOWN OF CHARLTON

WHEREAS, Kathryn and David Arnold are the owners of certain real property, known as the Scotch Ridge Farm (the "Property") consisting of approximately 44.5 acres, which includes parcel numbers 223.-1-11.2 and a portion of 223.-1-13.12 and 223.-1-12, located on Jersey Hill Road in the Town of Charlton, Saratoga County, New York. The Grantors (Arnolds) desire to protect the Property for agricultural purposes by conveying a permanent conservation easement on the land and leverage the protection of an additional 156.3 acre owned adjacent parcel under a separate conservation easement; and

WHEREAS, the Property is in active agricultural production as the Scotch Ridge Farm and features productive agricultural soils, including 79% Prime Soils and 1% Soils of Statewide Importance as defined by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Natural Resources Conservation Services; and

WHEREAS, the Property is located within Saratoga County's Agricultural District #2, created pursuant to Article 25-AA of the New York State Agriculture and Markets Law (the "AML"). Section 300 states: "It is hereby found and declared that many of the agricultural lands in New York State are in jeopardy of being lost for any agricultural purposes. When nonagricultural development extends into farm areas, competition for limited resources results... it is, therefore, the declared policy of the state to conserve, protect and encourage the development and improvement of its agricultural land for production of food and other agricultural products... It is the purpose of this article to provide a locally-initiated mechanism for the protection and enhancement of New York State's agricultural lands as a viable segment of the local and state economies and as an economic and environmental resource of major importance."; and

**WHEREAS**, Saratoga County adopted an *Agricultural and Farmland Protection Plan* in December 1997 that recommends supporting local farmland conservation projects by encouraging: "partnerships between landowners, local governments, private organizations, and county to leverage access to existing state and federal funds for purchase of development rights;" and by encouraging "landowners to learn more about private conservation options like conservation easements and promote public-private partnerships to expand these efforts"; and

**WHEREAS**, Saratoga County adopted a *Green Infrastructure Plan* in November 2006 that recommends the County to "Help County municipalities and other partners create protection priorities, goals, and strategies for the conservation of natural heritage" and create farmland core areas, which this Property is located within and contributes to; and

**WHEREAS**, the Town of Charlton adopted a Comprehensive Plan in 2007 which states: "Encouraging farmers to continue working the land is recognized as the most effective and lowest

cost method of preserving open space", and "Consider establishing a Purchase of Development Rights program where appropriate, and make use of state, county and other programs to minimize local costs."; and

**WHEREAS**, the Town of Charlton adopted a Farmland Protection Plan in February, 2010 which states: "The town should actively promote farmland protection through voluntary conservation easements...to ensure land stays open and available for farming."; and

**WHEREAS,** Saratoga PLAN is a New York not-for-profit corporation within the meaning of Article 49, Title 3 or the Environmental Conservation Law of the State of New York (together with any successor statute, the "ECL"), is organized for, among other purposes, conserving real property, is a tax exempt and qualified organization within the meaning of Sections 501(c)(3), 509(a) and 170(b)(1)(A)(vi) of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code"), and is a "qualified organization" to accept, purchase, and hold conservation easements under Section 170(h) of the Code of Treasury Regulation Section 1.170A-14(c); and

**WHEREAS.** Saratoga PLAN determined that accepting an Easement on the Property will enhance the long-term agricultural values of the Property and promote the use of soil conservation practices, which will further Saratoga PLAN's charitable purposes of protecting the distinctive rural character of Saratoga County and its lands and waters of a significant historic and ecological value; and

**WHEREAS**, the Grantors and Saratoga PLAN agree that the purpose of the agricultural conservation easement will be to conserve viable agricultural land by preventing the conversion of the Property to non-farm uses. In achieving such prevention, the Property shall be forever reserved for continued agricultural use; and

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Town of Charlton Town Board endorses the submission of an application from Saratoga PLAN to the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets for funding to Purchase Development Rights on the Scotch Ridge Farm Property and for Saratoga PLAN to hold and uphold a perpetual conservation easement on the land.

WHEREAS, Mary and Leland Bramer and Mary Opalka are the owners of certain real property, known as the Blue Corners Farm (the "Property") consisting of approximately 75 acres, which includes parcel numbers 223.-1-34.2 and 223.-1-34.1, located on Westline Road in the Town of Charlton, Saratoga County, New York, which said owners desire to protect the Property for agricultural purposes by conveying a permanent conservation easement on the land; and

**WHEREAS**, the Property is in active agricultural production as Blue Corners Farm and features productive agricultural soils, including 44.7% Prime Soils and 38% Soils of Statewide Importance as defined by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Natural Resources Conservation Services; and

WHEREAS, the Property is located within Saratoga County's Agricultural District #2, created pursuant to Article 25-AA of the New York State Agriculture and Markets Law (the "AML"). Section 300 states: "It is hereby found and declared that many of the agricultural lands in New York State are in jeopardy of being lost for any agricultural purposes. When nonagricultural development extends into farm areas, competition for limited resources results... it is, therefore, the declared policy of the state to conserve, protect and encourage the development and improvement of its agricultural land for production of food and other agricultural products... It is the purpose of this article to provide a locally-initiated mechanism for the protection and enhancement of New York State's agricultural lands as a viable segment of the local and state economies and as an economic and environmental resource of major importance."; and

**WHEREAS**, the Grantors and Saratoga PLAN agree that the purpose of the agricultural conservation easement will be to conserve viable agricultural land by preventing the conversion of the Property to non-farm uses. In achieving such prevention, the Property shall be forever reserved for continued agricultural use.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Town of Charlton Town Board endorses the submission of an application from Saratoga PLAN to the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets for funding to Purchase Development Rights on the Blue Corners Farm Property and for Saratoga PLAN to hold and uphold a perpetual conservation easement on the land.

**WHEREAS,** the Town recognizes the roles of volunteer firefighters and ambulance workers in securing the safety and well-being of the community, and finds it to be in the best interests of the Town residents to encourage volunteerism for such purposes; and

WHEREAS, the Town's intent is to provide a partial real property tax exemption to qualifying volunteer firefighters and ambulance workers as set forth in Real Property Tax Law §466a and for the un-remarried spouses of qualifying enrolled volunteer firefighters and volunteer ambulance workers; and

**WHEREAS,** the Town Board caused to have drafted a local law to provide a partial real property tax exemption of up to ten (10%) percent of the assessed value of real property owned by qualifying volunteer firefighters and ambulance workers, and the un-remarried spouses of enrolled volunteer firefighters and volunteer ambulance workers; and

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to New York State Law, the Town Board scheduled and held a Public Hearing on said local law on February 27, 2023, wherein the Public was invited to attend and provide comment thereon.
