PUBLIC HEARING

The Public Hearing for proposed increase in term to four-year term for the elective offices of the Town Supervisor and the Highway Superintendent was held at the Charlton Town Hall and called to order by Supervisor Grasso at 7:35 p.m.

Present: Supervisor Grasso, Councilman Glavin, Councilman Robbins, Councilman St. John, Councilman Tasse.

Also present: Town Clerk Brenda Mills.

Absent: Attorney Craig.

Town Clerk Mills read the following Legal Notice and confirmed that it was published in the official newspaper, The Daily Gazette on Wednesday April 12th, 2023:

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that the Town Board of the Town of Charlton will hold a public hearing regarding the proposed increase in term to a four-year term for the elective offices of the Town Supervisor and the Highway Superintendent, on April 24, 2023 at 7:30 p.m. at the Town Hall, 758 Charlton Road, Charlton, New York. All persons desiring to be heard thereon will be heard. Any changes in term limits will be subject to mandatory referendum.

Supervisor Grasso said that in 2019 the Town went through a similar process to increase the elective terms of the Town Clerk and the Tax Collector to four-year terms. We are looking to do the same thing for the Highway Superintendent and the Supervisor. Due to the complexity of the positions, it takes a good year or two to learn the position, get up to speed and implement plans. A four-year term just makes more sense and is more advisable. A four-year term might also be more appealing to residents who might consider running for office in Charlton.

If the Board approves the resolutions to change the terms to four-years, it will be subject to a mandatory referendum in November. If passed by vote in November, the four-year terms would not go into effect until the term beginning in 2026.

The floor was opened for public comment.

Robin Sevinsky, resident, said that she totally supports the 4-year term. She knows from experience that it is difficult getting up to speed with a new job and there is a learning curve. She feels that the longer a person can be in that role, the better they can do their job.

Bob Killeen, resident, said that by the time you get into office, you are just learning the ropes. He supports the 4-year term. He also said that there will be fewer election signs blowing around and messing up areas if the elections were every four years.

No one else chose to speak.

Supervisor Grasso said that although that public hearing was closing, the Board would still welcome comments from residents.

Town Updates:

Good news that we have executed our Town Water agreement with the Town of Glenville for the next 10 years. The agreement maintains the residential rate, meaning that Charlton residents will pay the same water rate as the Town of Glenville residents. The agreement maintains the minimum usage of 14 million gallons per year. We currently use about 41 million gallons per year. Glenville has asked that we pass on a \$1,200 hook-up fee. The Supervisor thanked the Town of Glenville for their willingness to work with Charlton.

Community Center – Supervisor Grasso said that we are in the throws of administering the federal grant that we have been awarded. Our signed paperwork was submitted to HUD about a month ago, and currently they have not signed it, acknowledged it or processed it, but this typical with the federal government. With out the written agreement we cannot start any kind of construction, however our soft costs are reimbursable. We did go out to bid for mold remediation. Last year we hired Ambient Environmental to do a mold study on the Community Center and they are helping us to find a company to remediate the mold. We do have a low bidder that we are prepared to recommend for award. An environmental review must be completed before we can enter into a contract.

There are 2 upcoming soft costs that are reimbursable before the paperwork is signed. One is to hire an Architect to do an Architectural Condition Assessment. We have a resolution for that tonight. We are also seeking a proposal from a Structural Design consultant.

The Board has received an Exceptional Use Permit application from Tammy Johnson on 912 Charlton Road, to provide indoor dog boarding services and in home dog training. The home sits back from the road about 700 feet and is surrounded by trees. The Town Board could retain jurisdiction of the application or refer it to the Zoning Board of Appeals. The Supervisor is recommending that the application be referred to the ZBA.

Supervisor Grasso said that the Town has not been able to find a new clerk for the Assessor's Office, as the current clerk would like to scale back her hours and retire. The Assessor has offered to go without a clerk but has asked for a reduction in the office hours to work Tuesday evenings and Saturdays from January to March and then just morning hours from April through December. Supervisor Grasso said that one thing he wanted to mention was that the Assessor and Town Clerk Saturday and Tuesday night hours were the same in the past so that there was no employee working alone in the building, from a logistics and security standpoint. No ecisionn was made by the Board.

Financial Updates:

The April Sales Tax Distribution amount was \$125,335.00 The total year-to-date sales tax receipts are \$512,201 which is 99% of the budgeted amount of \$516,668.00.

County Updates:

The County EMS Coordinator sent a Mutual Aid report through the end of March. Ballston Lake EMS is averaging less than 5% of calls being turned over to another service. They feel that this is because they have added another daytime crew which is their busiest time period. They are helping their neighboring providers. Year-to-date mutual aid calls are 4.5% for Ballston Lake EMS, 4.2% for Community, and 8.4% for Galway EMS.

COUNCILMAN REPORTS

Councilman Glavin – Water Presentation to the Town Board: Councilman Glavin said that this presentation is mainly for the Town Board but said that the public could ask questions at the end of the meeting.

Councilman Glavin said that the Town of Charlton purchases our water from the Town of Glenville. Glenville gets their water from the Great Flats aquifer of the Mohawk River. Charlton has about 675 end users of Town water system.

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CHARLTON WATER SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT STUDY

Water System Facts:

- Water Source: The Town of Glenville supplies the Town of Charlton Water System:
 - The Glenville water supply comes from the Great Flats Aquifer (also known as the Schenectady Aquifer) through four drilled wells
 - The Great Flats Aquifer is one of the most productive in the State of New York. The aquifer is an extensive bed of sands and gravel underlying the Mohawk River channel. The Great Flats Aquifer produces clear, clean water without any major chemical constituents except the hardness
 - Charlton Water System is connected to the Glenville supply in the Southern portion of Town across from the Charlton Heights School
 on Stage Rd. It is a community water system and is regulated by the Department of Health NYSDOH
- Customers: The Chariton system serves ~2000 people, ~675 metered end user units, primarily residents, Town Facilities, Schools, several businesses, in the southern portion of town from the hamlet, in areas of higher density or cluster residences.
- System Components: The booster pump house (2 pumps, valves, instrumentation, controls), and back up disinfection system is located at 163 Stage Rd. The water tower (head tank) is located on Cherry Rd. off Swaggertown Rd. about 800 feet from Charlton Rd. There are 13+ Miles of underground pipe (mains and laterals), ~ 130 Mn. line valves, and 86 Hydrants.
- Operations: The town water superintendent / certified operator (D Flynn), oversees the operations, maintenance, and modifications to the system. Water Clerk (K Caron), oversees meter readings and billing and related communications.
 - Water Testing: The system is periodically tested to ensure compliance with safe drinking water requirements as required by NYSDOH

Town Board comments and questions:

Supervisor Grasso said in term of costs, we are looking at less than \$50,000 for backup parts and replacing the aging 8" pipe (Hillandale, Anthony, Meadow Lane). He feels it would be appropriate to move forward with these items as the Town has the money for this. In terms of additional source lines, this is a costly endeavor. There is grant money available to help projects such as installing additional water source lines. If grant money was not awarded, it could be passed on the end users through additional water taxes or fees. Additional clarifications and study would be helpful. There will be no decisions tonight and no final decision will be made at the water commissioners meeting, but it is something we can talk about.

Supervisor Grasso said that water extensions encourage developers, and that is not the intention of the Board to have any increased development in the Town. The Town Board is extremely mindful of this and he wants to put residents as ease. The supervisor thanked Councilman Glavin for his work on this project.

Councilman St. John said that there are a number of infrastructure issues identified and he feels that it is this Board's responsibility to take care of them.

Public Comments:

Chris Mitchell asked if it would be advantageous to hook up to the County source? Are their rates lower? Supervisor Grasso said that he thinks that the County's rates are a little higher. We could connect to the County or Ballston to strengthen our negotiating posture, but we are thankful that Glenville was so willing to work with us. We just signed a 10-year agreement, so there is no immediate concern.

Jim Sevinsky said that he agrees with Councilman St. John. We need to take care of infrastructure problems and get the pumps. He said it is inevitable that wherever there are water lines there will be requests for development. He wants the Board to be mindful of this. He suggests going forward with our action plans and suggested pre-plans regarding various failures, including water breaks. He feels that it is a very good study, would suggest having contingency plans for water line breaks, etc. He is familiar with aquifers and thinks that the agreement reached with Glenville is spectacular.

RESOLUTION TO HIRE THALER REILLY WILSON ARCHITECTURE & PRESERVATION, LLP TO PREPARE A CONDITION REPORT FOR THE CHARLTON COMMUNITY CENTER REHABILITATION PROJECT

WHEREAS, the Town Board has previously determined it to be in the best interests of the Town to have the Charlton Community Center building repaired and rehabilitated due to the deterioration and current condition of the building; and

WHEREAS, the Town, pursuant to its' Procurement Policy, solicited numerous firms to provide bids and proposals to do a formal Condition Report and Assessment for said repairs and rehabilitation, and two firms were further interviewed and asked for written proposals; and

WHEREAS, the Town has received a quote and estimate from Thaler Reilly Wilson Architecture & Preservation, LLP, located at 25 Monroe Street, Suite 202, Albany, New York, 12210, to perform said assessment and provide a report, which meets all of the Town's criteria and specifications for said project, and with an anticipated completion date acceptable to the Town Supervisor; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board believes Thaler Reilly Wilson Architecture & Preservation, LLP to be the best choice to perform the work, at the most reasonable cost and best value and expense to the Town.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Board of the Town of Charlton awards to, and hires, Thaler Reilly Wilson Architecture & Preservation, LLP, of 25 Monroe Street, Suite 202, Albany, New York, to assess and provide a formal Condition Report on the Charlton Community Center building, at a cost not to exceed \$26,000.00, all as set forth on the attached proposal, to be completed within a time period and date acceptable and as agreed to with the Town Supervisor, and subject to providing proof of proper insurance coverage; and it is further
